Dear Hanover Selectmen:

On November 3, about 120 Upper Valley residents brought old pesticides, herbicides, solvents, cleaners, paint, and other "Household Hazardous Wastes" to the Harford, Vermont Fire Station. A State certified hauler, New England Marine Corporation, packaged and trucked away twenty four 55-gallon drums of this hazardous material to Western New York State for reprocessing, recycling, and disposal in a "secure" landfill.

This collection was planned for and sponsored by the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee, as part of its Household Hazardous Waste public awareness program. The Committee is comprised of the following organizations:

Montshire Museum Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council Upper Valley Solid Waste District Upper Valley Sierra Club

League of Women Voters Hanover Conservation Council Hanover Co-op Foodstore Upper Valley Green-Up Day Chairs

Major funding for the collection was provided by the Vermont Agency of Environmental Conservation, to cover the collection costs for the Vermont side of the River. Unfortunately, the State of New Hampshire had already committed its limited funds to a similar project in the Durham area — despite the fact that the Upper Valley project was much further along. Fortunately, Vermont agreed not to refuse the wastes from New Hampshire communities and, in fact, almost half the wastes came from our side of the River.

The Collection Day was a tremendous success. The rate of participation of Upper Valley communities was about double the rates experienced in other parts of the country. As a result, the volume of wastes collected (and therefore the bill from the hauler) was about double what was projected. Consequently, there is a \$2500 shortfall.

We are writing on behalf of the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee, to request that the Town of Hanover contribute \$1000 toward the shortfall. This is based on the number of Hanover residents who participated in the collection, as a percentage of the total number of participants. Since about 20% of the participants were from Hanover, a \$1000 contribution would cover a proportionate share of the costs. We are making similar requests of the other towns with significant participation in the collection.

The Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee believes that the proper collection and disposal of household hazardous wastes is a significant step toward solving our regional waste disposal problems. Not only will the waste stream be reduced, the public will become more aware of the overall waste disposal problem. An informed and aware public will be more willing to face the tough choices ahead and the waste will be less likely to end up in municipal landfills and treatment plants.

Thank you for your consideration of our request. We will be available at your January 7 meeting to answer any questions about the November 3 collection, or future efforts. Feel free to call Geoff at the Montshire if you would like to discuss this before then.

Many of the towns who have committed funds for the spring collection day need to be billed by UV-LSC. Norwich has promised \$100 towards the deficit - and they need to be sent a memo (after town meeting) to remind them (c/o John Lawes). It is still unclear what Norwich could possibly do towards the spring collection.

PUBLICITY - The Committee voted NOT to insert flyers into town reports, because of uncertainty of funding and of a hauler at this point. This would also have meant an upfront expenditure of approx. \$400 to print 5,000 + brochures, which will be sent home with school children again anyway.

More discussion of publicity will ensue at next week's meeting.

FEE - The Committee decided it would not charge a fee for collection this spring. We will have an obvious place for donations.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - NH

There is a possibility that NH superfund money might be utilized to fund household hazardous waste collection projects. Geoff and Margy will find out where the bill is, so that Committee members can get their letters off to the appropriate committee.

DATE: November 1, 1985

As you know, the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Days held November 3, 1984 and May 4, 1985 were a tremendous success, with nearly 130 participants at each event.

We are especially proud of the fact that the May 4th Collection Day was funded almost entirely with local dollars, with about \$6,000 coming from municipal budgets and about \$2,500 from private contributions solicited by the Committee.

We are now planning our third Collection Day, to be held in the spring of 1986 in conjunction with "Green-Up" Day. In order to make this event possible, we will again need your support to raise the necessary funds. We therefore respectfully request that each Solid Waste District Representative seek to have household hazardous waste funds included in your municipal solid waste budget, which we assume is being prepared now. A level similar to last year's contribution should be sufficient.

Thank you for your support as we attempt to address the solid waste needs of our region. Please contact Bob Varney if you have any questions.

SUBJECT: Hazardous Waste Collection

Attached are Al's notes on conducting more frequent hazardous waste collections. Collection of household materials once per month appears to be feasible. If this is the Council's wish, we will need additional funds and approval of the budget by member towns. The current cost is approximately \$4,500 per collection. The cost will surely taper off as more materials are collected and the quantities in long-term storage in homes decreases. I would recommend an additional \$59,000 if we're to provide this service.

The concept of collecting all hazardous waste for the community is scary. The only way this could work is to handle very small quantities. Even then, the costs should be borne by the industries depositing the wastes. The overall collection would require specially qualified, professional personnel. It would also require new structures and monitoring. If this choice is to be pursued, I would recommend \$5,000 for a feasibility study to outline costs, benefits, and possible problems.

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION SITE

At the budget review sessions, the question was asked about setting up a limited household waste collection site.

In talking with State Hazardous Waste Management about setting up a site at the Landfill, it was stated that the City could open a site with control being under State Hazardous Waste Management. Following their guidelines, we must have a contingency plan for the site, a listing of all acceptable items, trained personnel, a special permit for the facility, and a hauler to transport waste to a permanent site, etc.

Robert Varney of the Upper Valley-Lake Sunapee Council advised that the City must ascertain whether or not a household hazardous waste collection site is economically feasible for the taxpayers of Lebanon. He noted, should the City undertake such a project, the City should limit the acceptance of waste to such items as paints, pesticides, oil and thinners. Mr. Varney advised against accepting high-tech chemicals as they generally cannot be mixed and stored safely in one facility; separate housing would be required.

Household Hazardous Waste Day conducted in Lebanon on May 4, 1985, generated twenty 55-gallon drums of waste at a cost of \$4,500 for the hauler, three men at the pick-up site, and a truck to haul the drums to a permanent site, which was done by New England Marine of Burlington, Vermont.

Ken Norton of New England Marine suggested we collect only oil base paints, thinners, and household wastes such as bleach, Drano, etc., and that we stay away from pesticides. Paint thinners and paints can go in bulk shipments at \$180/drum; anything that has to be labpacked would cost \$250/drum. These prices are estimates only due to the frequent change in his costs for taking care of these products. He has noted the documentation of waste is estimated to cost approximately \$1,000 per year, as everything that goes into a waste drum must be recorded. Mr. Norton suggested a once-a-month pick-up, and advised the City not to store waste more than 90 days on site.

There are more details to be worked out for a hazardous waste collection site to become a reality such as: cost of storage facilities, personnel training costs, a contingency plan, and permit costs.

I hope this will help answer the questions raised at the review sessions.

1. Budget: Bob Varney reported that the state of New Hampshire has given HHWC 15 cents per capita funding, which is matched with local funding (50-50). He has calculated that the service area covered by this funding is approximately \$4,750. (Lebanon has allocated \$5,000. in their budget). Bob has applied for additional funding through the state of Vermont (which might offer 10 cents per capita funding) and is waiting for a response.

- 2.Interim storage: Ann Crow suggested that pick-up dates for Lebanon, Springfield, Claremont and Rutland be staggered throughout the calendar year to eleviate pressure on interim storage of hazardous materials. Bob Varney will discuss this with these groups. Ann also recommended the use of a hot-line telephone number from the Chemical Manufacturer's Association (800-CMA-8200) which can answer disposal questions.
- 3. Public Relations: Alice Jackson reported on the schedule of radio programs to be recorded by HHWC members, as well as other promotional ideas. The hazardous waste garbage can will again be used as a promotional device in the Hanover Co-op, and plans are under way to use it in other places as well.
- 4. Education Committee: The March road show was a great success, and Alice Jackson hopes that it will motivate more Lyme residents to participate in the Pick-Up Day in May.
- 5. Vikke Jas reported that she is simplifing the Pick-Up Day survey, and will call the hauler for more information on aerosol can puncturing before spraying (we are hoping that the hauler can supply something which will make this task safer and easier). She is also attending the March 22-23 New England Environmental Conference at Tufts University and will participate in workshops on "Recycling as an Approach to Dealing with Solid Waste", "The Economics of Hazardous Waste Management", "Source Reduction", and "Bioregionalism", and will report what she has learned to the group in April.

Household Hazardous Waste Update by Pat Weyrick

The "Meeting of the Minds" was held October 6 in the Howe Library, organized and hosted by the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee. The purpose was to draw together state and local officials as well as participants of past and future collection days for an opportunity for informational exchange. The evening proved to be a most successful networking experience, as many ideas, problems and solutions came to light.

There was a wide representation of collection day participants -- ranging from the Rochester-Dover area in NH to the N.E. Kingdom of Vt. Among the participants were Andy Roleau, Solid Waste Planning Specialist; Bob Varney, U.V. Lake Sunapee Council; Donna Reardon, Div. of Public Health, Office of Waste Management, NH; Connie Leach, Project Manager NH/VT Solid Waste Project; Eric Edelstein, Director of Research of Windsor Environmental Research, N. Pomfret; and Nancy Everhart, VT PIRG. (Note: Nancy was a principal author of a bill in the Vt. Legislature regarding Public Education of Disposal. For information on the current status of this bill and for what you can do to help -- letter writing, support, etc. -- please contact her directly at 43 State Street, Montpelier, Vt. (802)

Some of the more disturbing information included the fact that used motor oil and car batteries, at this point, probably can no longer be recycled free of charge due to chane in cost of collecting these materials. Organizations used to be paid for recycling oil, but as it stands now, there probably will be a charge for its collection. Also, DDT is not accepted at collection days by haulers at this time as the cost of analysis to determine its concentration is too high. Another point of concern was the fact that it is generally very easy for a hauler to obtain a license to haul hazardous wastes, usually requiring only a fee, a proper driver's license, and completion of an application.

"Generator" status was also discussed. The generator is the party who assumes the liability aspects of the hazardous material for insurance purposes -- and is responsible for that material from that point on, forever. The haulers usually accept this responsibility, but the group generally felt that the state should assume it since many municipalities are involved in collection days.

An excellent idea was posed by Robert MacNeil, President of Noel Vincent Trucking (a local trash disposal company). He often encounters and is approached about materials which are not permitted for safe disposal at landfills. He felt that if trash haulers were given cards to give customers or stickers to place on unacceptable materials with a phone number to call regarding proper disposal of these materials, this would be an excellent opportunity to educate the public on proper disposal methods. (The Upper

Valley Committee is currently becoming involved in this process.)

The knowledge gained and the problems posed at this meeting are hopefully only the beginning of a continuing network of information exchange on this very important issue. Help Wanted For Houseold Hazardous Waste Collection Day



Congress Getting A Good Start On Environmental Issues

In January the Congress passed and sent to the President the same clean water bill that made it through the previous session with a unanimous vote. Showing its anger at the President's pocket veto last fall, both the House and the Senate made the renewal of the Clean Water Act bill number 1. After the President again vetoed the bill the vote to override was overwhelming.

Following the February recess the Senate overwhelmingly passed the Energy Conservation Appliance Act (modified by a minor amendment removing the requirement that the Energy Department be required to review the situation every five years and recommend strengthening it if it feels that is needed), and the day this article was being ridden I hear that the House did the same thing. Although the President's veto last year appeared to involve much more than the issue of the minor amendment, Senator Gramm claimed that the Administration was satisfied with the amended bill and would not veto it. Watch for the latest news on this one!

The completion of work on these two issues leaves the Congress free to tackle other needed environmental legislation, such as Acid Rain. Indications from some of our Congressmen and Senators suggest they are interested in pushing harder this year on acid rain than they did last year, but in the end nothing will happen unless we citizens help by expressing our concerns. See article elsewhere in the Newsletter on acid rain.

"Meeting of the Minds", October 6, 1986 Program Summary

Fourty people attended the program which was held at the Howe Library in Hanover, New Hampshire. They represented regional planning agencies, state solid and household hazardous waste staff personnel, waste management businesses, public and private advocacy organizations, citizens groups, and interested non-affiliated individuals. Both New Hampshire and Vermont were represented, with individuals traveling from the Northeast Kingdom in northern Vermont to southern New Hampshire. Well established collection groups as well as groups just in the planning stages of their first collection attended.

The program opened with a "get-acquainted" time when participants had refreshments looked at displays of brochures, flyers, posters and other materials, and met other individuals, many for the first time.

The formal program began with a presentation by the Hanover League of Women Voters, who are active members of the Household Hazardous Waste Committee, an organization which sponsors a collection in Lebanon, New Hampshire annually. Alice Jackson and Ruth Devaney presented a history of household hazardous waste collections in the country, and listed some concerns about the future of collections, and the effectiveness and safety of landfilling toxic chemicals.

Joyce Noll and Charlotte Faulkner, both League and HHWC members, gave an excellent slide presentation about existing collections, using the Lebanon collection as an example. The slides demonstrated how the HHWC organized the logistics of their May collection.

The floor was then opened for discussion, which was lively and extensive. The following summaries topics discussed:

Liability:

What will happen in the future? Are Household Hazardous Waste Collections protected form future liablity?

The future is indeed questionable. A national conference about HHWC's sponsored by the Environmental Protection Agency will hopefully answer some of these questions. The conference is free of charge and will take place on November 19 and 20 in Arlington, Virginia at the Quality Inn. For more information, please call Vikke Jas at the Montshire.

Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee

When we think of hazardous waste, we probably picture corroding drums or a flaming tanker. It is easy to ignore our own seemingly insignificant contributions to the problem of hazardous waste disposal. Yet most of us use paint, anti-freeze, varnish, household cleaners, and many other products that are toxic, corrosive, flammable, or explosive.

What happens to the left-over varnish, the dirty crankcase oil, the insecticide left in the can, and the household cleaners? In most homes, these wastes are stored in the barn, taken to the dump, or poured down the drain into septic system pipes to treatment plants.

A number of concerned organizations and individuals in the Upper Valley banded together to address this problem. In 1984 they formed the Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee. Organizations represented on the Committee include the Upper Valley Solid Waste District, the Upper Valley Lake Sunapee Council; Montshire Museum of Science; League of Women Voters, Hanover Co-op; Hanover Conservation Council; the Green-Up Day Committee; and the Sierra Club, as well as a number of private citizens and town officials.

In November 1984 the Committee organized the Househol Hazardous Waste Collection Day, the first such program to be carried out in either Vermont or New Hampshire. Held at the Hartford Fire Station, the program was highly successful, with about 110 households participating. A total of 24 fifty-five gallon drums were filled and taken by a licensed hauler to an EPA approved facility in upstate New York.

The second annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day was held on May 4, 1985, in conjunction with Green-Up Day. Over 130 households safely disposed of their hazardous wastes with the hauler at the former Pringle's site, now owned by Dartmouth College, on Route 120. The Upper Valley's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day Program has become a model for other collection recently held in other regions of New Hampshire and Vermont. In comparision to other collection days recently held in other areas, our collection program has had the highest rate of particiaption and the lowest cost of any similar program.

In 1986, over 240 household particpated in the May collection, which was also held at the Pringle's site. These collections have proven themselves as not only a safe way to eliminate hazardous materials from the community, but they also serve as a terrific vehicle in educating the public about the proper use, storage, and disposal of hazardous products.

Financial support for the Collection day comes from the states of New Hampshire and Vermont, local communities, nonprofit organizations and private businesses. We are very appreciative of this support and concern for our environment.

The fourth annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day will be held in the spring of 1987, again in conjunction with Green-Up Day.

We look forward to seeing you there!

Household products become hazardous wastes when they are not used, stored or disposed of safely. By learning how to handle these products, you can make your own home a safer and healthier place to live. Approximately 80% of Norther New England residents depend on groundwater supplies for their drinking water. By dumping hazardous chemicals on the ground, we pollute the environment and poison ourselves. By not wisely using these products while in our homes, we can endanger our health, especially those with respiratory problems, the elderly and the very young. Here are some tips on handling household products safely: Digion handling betweehold products softle

PURCHASE

Read labels and compare products. Look for "nontoxic" listing. Use alternative products. Many products are less toxic and just as effective. Buy only what you need, and share leftover products with a neighbor.

Buy nonserosol products.

<u>USE</u>

Use products in well ventilated room. Wear protective clothing. can create fumes, explosions, or even more toxic combinations. NEVER mix products. Mixing chemicals, Follow label directions.

In case of poisoning, call the nearest Control Center: don't rely on the label; it may be incorrect.

Store in a well ventilated. safe area. Keep away from children and pets. Close containers tightly. Keep products in original containers. Do not remove original label information.

DISPOSAL

Take used motor oil to your - 3 th sentence local recycling center. NEVER pour hazardous products \ 1 dq 2 nd sudiu on the ground or down a drain was wiled. Bring your household toxics to 7 your local household hazardous water collection, where they can be disposed of safely by a licensed contractor.

While Household Hazardous Waste Collections aren't the only answer to our Hazardous Waste Problems, they are one of the best ways available to safely dispose of toxic products. Other solutions are being sought by industry, government, and the public. We need to realize that we are all responsible for the problem, and that we can all be a part of the solution. Encourage others to participate in Household Hazardous Waste Collections, and think twice before buying a potentially hazanious household product. We are all responsible for the wise use (store and (dispose of these products when they are no longer useful.

Montshire Museum - Public Issues Program Cooperative Community and Hazardous Material Managment Program Proposal to the Jessie B. Cox Trust - April 1987

SUMMARY

During 1986-87 the Montshire assessed the region's need for hazardous material education. Our perceptions is of a patchwork of responsible entities with no mechanism for communication, lack of awareness in the general community about the issue, and the reality of a major incident occurring in our region. More important, we also see the human and physicial resources available locally to cope with any problems which might arise. The program goal is to develop communication between the need and the resources and provide support through public education.

Therefore, the Montshire has dedicated the next two years to a major public education campaign about hazardous material management. The project targets a serious and immediate environmental issue: hazardous material - how can we reduce it, store it, move it and dispose of it safely. The challenge is to develop local responsibility for its management and for environmental protection.

Starting in September 1987, and building on the planning work of this past year, we will provide programs and speakers for local businesses, municipal officials, the general public, and school children. Drawing on our extensive experience and success at building coalitions the Montshire will build the necessary community networks between industry, local and State government agencies, and area organizations. Summer of 1988 will culminate in a mock spill activity to excersize the communication networks formed, and to publicize the program. The last year will focus on assessing communication, increasing public education, and institutionalzing the networks.

Financial and verbal support from area industry through the Montshire Associates, the Upper Valley Compliance Officers Network, The Upper Valley Household Hazardous Waste Committee, local Governments and area Fire Chiefs convince us that the project is timely and that we are the best organization to carry out the task.

- 1. Deecie McNelly stopped by to discuss some misunderstandings between UVHHWC and the Montshire. She emphasized that the Montshire supports UVHHWC efforts, and that all Montshire activities and fundraising went to support this group's efforts. Both groups agreed to better communicate with each other in the future.
- A brief summary of the Collection (a detailed summary to follow):

Donations:

\$684.00 in donations were collected at the site, with \$250.00 of those funds were given as payment by a painting contractor to dispose of his 40 gallons of gummed-up paint thinner. The final bill from North East Solvents Services is enclosed.

Surveys:

Nan and Alan King collated the results of the surveys. summary will break down the results, but unfortunately, somehow during the Collection, surveys were lost. While a car counts went over 300, we only collected about 200 surveys. For the next Collection, one person needs to be in charge of the surveys so that we can better track our participants.

Ideas and Suggestions for Next Year: See enclosed seperate sheet.

3. The Reorganization of UVHHWC:

It was collectively agreed upon that the Committee needs to reorganize its efforts so that we can continue to organize a Collection, as well as serve the larger function of educating the public about household hazardous waste. The next meeting will address these issues, and particiannts are asked to think about the following questions and be prepared to discuss them:

*What specific roles and tasks need to be done, and what are your interests?

*Who and how can the Committee better raise funds?

Suggestions for Household Hazardous Waste Collection

- While cars wait in line it is a golden opportunity for education = bulletin boards, video - what not to buy etc.
- 2. One person should be in charge of Area No. 1 cars arriving - questionnaires.
- 3. Did we thank the students who came to help?
- 5. Name tags for workers
- 6. Alice "Lack of clearly defined contents hinders the consumer's ability to make buying choices. Recommendations such as "Dispose of in a safe manner" do little to assist the consumer in making proper disposal decisions."
- 7. In general, household products contain less toxic/hazardous substance than those cherns used in commercial or industrial processes. Consumer products have tended in recent years to become safer or to contain smaller quantities of fewer kinds of the "better-documented" toxic chemicals, either in response to regulation, economics (including increased costs of constituents and hazardous waste disposal), the market place, or liability concerns. However, toxic or haz constituents are common in household products and warrant concern in their disposal.
- 8. Pesticides 2 national surveys found pesticides in over 90% of homes. The usage study (Savage et al.), many households use pesticides inside the house (disinfectants, pet flea products, mothballs) than in the yard or garden (e.g. "classic" pesticides such as insecticides/herbicides). The most used pesticides, in descending order by frequency of occurence, are:
 - o disinfectants [which contain insecticides.]
 Content include e.g. cresof, phenolics
 - o mothballs & flakes

[chlorobenzenes, naphthalenes]

- o pet flea collars
 - [...stirofos, carbaryl, propoxus]
- o no-pest strips
- o other pet pesticides, such as flea shampoo & powders
